
Starting June 4th Adults & High School Students

Starting June 4th Kids Sunday School (grades 1-8)


The Incredibles

Other staff members assisted with teaching throughout the program months, including Dr. Casto-Waters, Rev. Lien, and Ms. Joy Maple. Topics included theology, worship, mission, spiritual disciplines, church history, church membership/stewardship, and evangelism, amongst others.

Over the course of this confirmation program, we watched these young people grow and mature in their faith, articulating their understanding in remarkable ways. They brought their energy and imagination to class and learned from one another as well. Listening to them talk about their faith and their hopes for the future of the church, I am encouraged about the impact they will have wherever life takes them, for they are faithful witnesses whom we may all be proud to claim as members of Reid Memorial!

Music Department History

Certainly, no story of the events that have transpired in the life of Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church could be complete without attention to the music ministry that has made, and continues to make, the church an outstanding place of worship in Augusta. The history that paints the picture of the music department of Reid becomes even more significant when consideration is made of the uniqueness of its leadership.

Did you know...

Mrs. Bright (Marge) McConnell was the Reid organist from 1962 to 1967. In 1963 she was joined by her daughter, Sandra Patton, who became choir director. Mrs. Patton became choir director in 1975. Mrs. McConnell was succeeded by another daughter, Mrs. Marge Russell, as organist in 1967. Mrs. Russell also served as choir director from 1967 until her sister assumed the position in 1975.

This unusual sibling combination, known in the Augusta music community as "the sisters", acted as joint music directors until their mutual retirements in 2001. Under their direction, the music program of Reid Memorial became one of the foremost in the community. Their leadership led to the expansion of the senior choir, organization of youth choirs, and the organization of a handbell choir that achieved outstanding recognition in its skill level. The acquisition of the bells was through a gift from Mr. and Mrs. William S. Morris III, who continued to support this special music ministry with additional gifts to update and enhance the handbell collection.

Dr. John G. Schaeffer Jr., professor of music and organ at then Augusta College (now Augusta University), became the organist at Reid in September 1971. His skill and interpretation of sacred music unfolded new avenues of worship and enjoyment for members of both the congregation and community alike. At his untimely death in 1997 various memorials in his name were directed for upgrading and updating the Reid Memorial organ. This opportunity led to the remodeling of our sanctuary and the rebuilding of the Schantz organ. Subsequently, a gift from the Charles Goodwin family covered the cost of the organ remodeling. In an act of the session, it was determined that funds given in memory of Dr. Schaeffer would be used to establish an annual concert on the new organ. It would be known as the John G. Schaeffer Memorial Organ Recital.

Upon their retirement as joint music directors, Sandra Patton and Marge Russell were honored by the chancel choir with the commissioning of an anthem to be composed in their name by noted musician Alfred Fedak. A printed copy of the anthem, which was first performed by the Reid Memorial choir on the date of their retirement, is now included in the hymnals in the sanctuary.

Reflections... Dr. John G. Schaeffer, Jr.

Teacher...


In the fall of 1971 entering my senior year as a music major at Augusta College, I encountered Dr. John Schaeffer. In his white shirt and tie he would arrive on campus riding his bicycle (briefcase attached), looking somewhat bedraggled with his shirttail always slightly out. His enigmatic persona was unlike any I had encountered amongst the music faculty.

For three quarters, I studied music history with him; writing down every word he said and pouring over my notes from his lectures in preparation for what would become his legendary exams. It was not too long into the first quarter of music history that I began to observe a witty, extremely intelligent, serious professor who expected the best from his students—as that was what he gave to us. Every lecture he enriched what we had read and intentionally filled our minds with all he knew.

Mentor...

In July 1983 the sanctuary of Grace United Methodist Church in North Augusta was struck by lightning and burned to the ground. As rebuilding began, the church decided that a pipe organ would be included in the new sanctuary. I approached John and asked if he would guide me in this process and serve as consultant as we determined who would build the instrument and how the instrument would be designed. Through his efforts the church acquired a fine two manual Schantz organ that was installed in 1985 shortly after moving into the new sanctuary. While modest in scale, John's knowledge of organ-building and organ literature resulted in a wonderful instrument that still leads the congregation effectively in worship and is a pleasure for recitalists to play.

With this new instrument at Grace, I felt compelled to study the organ in a more formal way. John graciously guided me through organ literature that would help me grow and serve as instrumental music for worship at Grace. I treasure the organ scores with his markings in them and think of him each time I play from them to this day.



Friend...

My friendship with John evolved from the time I graduated from Augusta College through his death. I enjoyed numerous candlelight dinner parties in his Fuqua Center residence; he was quite the chef. And the stories he could tell! I regularly turned pages for him as he played organ recitals (with commentary that only I could hear as he performed). His recitals enriched and educated the Augusta community on the joy of organ music.

John Schaeffer was like no other person I have known. I cannot adequately or completely explain the privilege and honor it was to have him as a teacher, mentor, and friend. But if you knew him in any of those ways, you understand what I mean. He was a kind, thoughtful, and spiritual man. Music was his greatest passion and the center of his being. In his letter of resignation as organist for Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church John said, "Being the organist at Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church has been the greatest joy of my life."

Adopt-A-Unit

The Mission Committee has been hard at work this year building relationships with existing partners as well as discovering new ways in which to serve. In our last Fountain, we highlighted the successful Hearts for Mission Day that was held in February. Hopefully, each of you had a chance to talk with organization representatives about how they serve the community as well as find opportunities for volunteering and donating. One of the newest opportunities to come our way was brought forward by Reid Memorial member SFC Thomas Mize.

Thomas connected our congregation with Alpha Company, A CO 151st ESB (Greenwood) of the 228th Tactical Theater Brigade, and suggested that we send some morale boosting care packages since they would be stationed in remote locations. With Thomas' guidance and your generosity, we were able to collect personal care items, snacks, games, and cards written by our youth, to send to our men and women deployed in the Middle East. We filled four packing boxes with enough donations to send to Alpha Company's base camp and three remote posts! They are winging their way to these destinations and will hopefully have arrived and been happily welcomed by the time you are reading this article!

Such efforts are one small way we can remember those who don't get to go to their homes at the end of the day, walk their dogs, or help children with homework. These men and women serve in inhospitable and often hostile places. A box of "goodies" may not sound like much, but reminders of home and notes that say "we care about you" are never small gestures for someone far away.
